The recent PKF Annual Fraud Indicator (2016) report puts total fraud losses to the UK at a staggering £193 billion. Couple this with evidence that fraud is costing SME's in the construction industry around £2 billion and it is clear that now, more than ever, contractors have to take steps to protect themselves.

Authorities can tackle some of the issues which lead to fraud in the sector: they can examine key data containing employee and contractor addresses; bank accounts can be analysed to highlight suspicious links, while reverse online auctions can be used to drive down prices, provide audit trails and foil rigged bids.
